Intervals

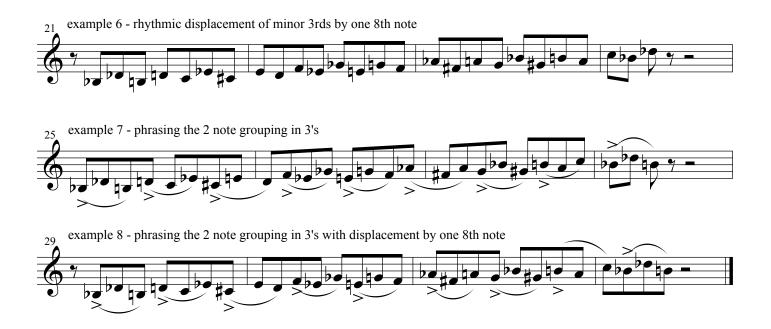
It is very important to be able to play all intervals on your instrument, starting from m3's to M7's at least. These intervals are found in all types of music, and playing them will help you hear them better as well as help with the development of your technique. Intervals are the building blocks for melodic and thematic development in jazz improvisation.



Do all four examples with all intervals: m3, M3, P4, TT, P5, m6, M6, m7, M7 plus m9, M9, etc..



Remember, you can always mess with the rhythm. Phrase the 2's in 3's or start on different beats.



You can see how you could go on and on with endless variations. Come up with your own and have fun with it. One good practice idea is to work on one interval per week. That way you really get inside of it. When you add the next interval remember to go back and review the one you did before.
